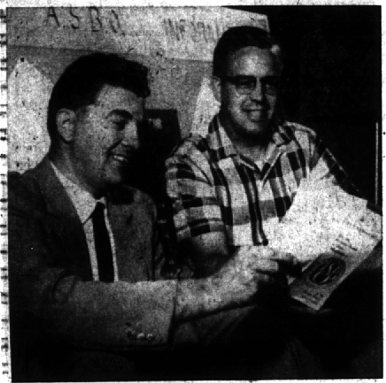

Mrs. Joel Warren, community information chairman of the library board will be one of a panel of four speakers who will lead the discussion. She will explain the need for the new library and tell about the gift of land on which it will be built.

Of special interest will be the photographs and a model of the proposed building to be presented at this meeting by Mark R. Jaroszewicz, of the architectural firm of Stickel, Jaroszewicz and Moody.

A report on a survey of West Bloomfield township pertinent to the needs of the community will be given by Robert Orr, library consultant and head librarian of Grosse Pointe library.

A summary of the panel discussion and the recommendations of the library board will be given by Mrs. Warren who will also explain the effect a defeat of the millage proposal will have on library service in the community.

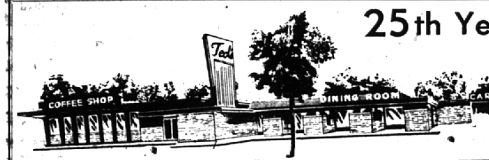

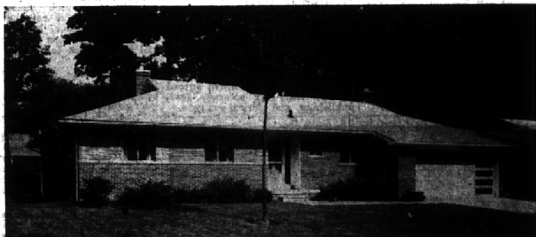

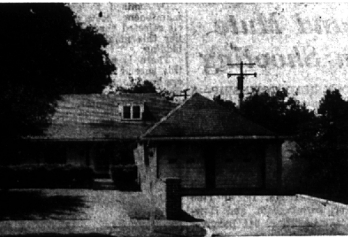
