Heading the benefit is the charming Mrs. Robert C. VanderKloot of Lone Pine road, Bloomfield Hills. Assisting her as co-chairman is Mrs. Wellock. Mrs. VanderKloot is a national sponsor of the SCF. The group, founded in 1932, is a non-profit, non-sectarian organization of child welfare, registered with the U. S. Dept. Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid.

AMONG THE national sponsors are Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Henry L. I. Hon. Herbert Hoover and many more. SCF administers the sponsorship of children, babies and rural schools overseas (refugees only) in Italy, France, Greece, Finland, West Germany, Austria, Korea and Lebanon. Also the sponsorship of children among the American Indians and schools in the American Southern Appalachian Mountain regions.

The fall event will be an all day affair with unusual, as well as practical articles from 17 countries to be sold. There will be jewelry from India, lace from Switzerland, wooden carvings from the Carolina mountain region and many more. The idea of the International Market was originated by Mrs. Alfred E. Grann, who's a member of the federation's national board.
