Guests were greeted at Birmingham Country club following the ceremony.

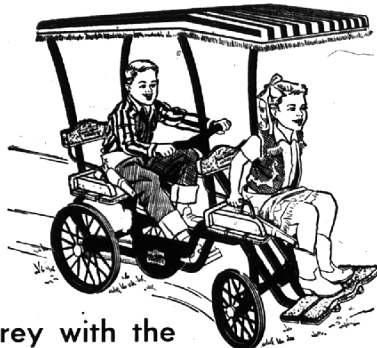
The new Mrs. Helmer changed into a dark brown sheath with matching jacket and accessories for her wedding trip to Kentucky.

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## EMU Courses Set in B'ham

Eastern Michigan University will conduct off-campus extension courses at some 20 different centers throughout lower Michigan this fall. Over 40 different classes will be offered in all and enrollment is expected to top the total of 1,927 enrolled during the fall semester last year.

Among the new centers where courses are being offered this year are Almont, Mason, Cranbrook, Birmingham, Trenton, Redford Union and Romulus.

In addition to the off-campus classes, some 56 undergraduate evening classes will be presented on the Eastern Michigan campus offering from 2-4 credit hours for completion of the required work.

The graduate division will have 74 on-campus evening courses available, a substantial increase over the 53 courses offered by the division in the fall of 1958. It is expected that over 700 will take part in the evening graduate program.

The "Dynamics of American Presidents" is the Adult education course being offered at Seaholm high school. It carries no credit. First class is September 21; time has not been set.

No information is available yet on the Cranbrook session.
