## Local Man Says Reds Infiltrate Churches

**MACKINAC ISLAND, Michigan**—Communists have infiltrated many churches of America and are using them as a cover to brainwash the nation, Theodore Guething, Detroit machine tool manufacturer, today told the summit strategy conference for Moral Re-Armament.

Guething of 881 Lake Park drive, Birmingham, said that the Detroit conference of one denomination had adopted a policy which "could not have been better written by Khrushchev himself. The program calls for total world disarmament, admission of Red China to the United Nations, an end to Selective Service, curtailment of civil defense, and the establishment of Berlin as a free city under U.N. supervision. All of these issues are Communist-inspired."

He told of one minister who in his sermons encourages the youth of his church to become conscientious objectors, advocates recognition of Red China, and sneers the House Un-American activities committee.

Guething said a number of ministers in the Detroit area are selling the lie that "the early Christians were Communists." Mr. Guething asked one of these clergymen whether he was a Communist. When he denied it, he said, "What is the difference between you and the way the early Christians lived? She said the so-called minister's jaw dropped.

And then he blurted out, "The capitalist system doesn't give the chance to share equally with each other." Guething's wife said, "But I share, don't you, and you have the equal opportunity to share with everybody else." At that point he rushed out of the room.

Later Guething's young son said, "I think that man is a Communist. Do you remember the Christmas play which he wrote and I acted in? Well, I looked it up in the Bi-


They watched hundreds of other physically handicapped men and women making the most of their abilities, doing the most with what they had.
