'Drip, Drip'— Sounds Like a Cash Register

There are some things that even the most avid water-users don't seem to know about consumption of the product, City Manager L. R. Gare indicated this week.

"Many individuals," he said, "simply cannot comprehend how a small leak can multiply itself into a sizeable item of cost."

To remedy the situation the City Water department has prepared a handbill to delivered to customers during the next three months by meter-readers.

The handbill urges immediate care for all water leaks, and checks to find hidden leaks.

THE HANDBILL points out that a leak 1/4 inch in diameter wastes 146,000 gallons per quarter (91 days) and costs \$54.75. A leak as small as 1/32 of an inch can waste as much as 2,281 in the same period—costing 86 cents.

The handbill, it was hoped, would pass this information to Birmingham water-users, "and save them any needless expense."

Most, Gare went on, do nothing about leaks of or possible leaks until they receive unusually high water bills. This, even after explanations by meter-readers of the possible expense of a suspected leak in a private plumbing system—a toilet flush bowl or water-cooled air-conditioning unit.

The handbill might, he said, cut down the estimated 400 to 500 such cases in Birmingham each year.

Richard Broxton, takes office tonight as Worshipful Master of Birmingham Lodge No. 44, F&AM.

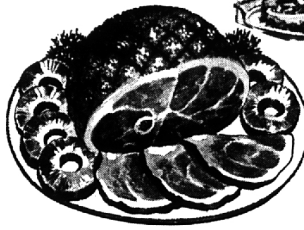
