

Franklin Man Objects to Bill For Road Work

FRANKLIN—Irate about a \$30 bill for the installation of a culvert, he says he doesn't need. Alan H. Stigleman of Woodside drive registered his complaint before the council Monday night.

Along with his objections to the method used in receiving the culvert and the bill, Stigleman also urged the council to reconsider its infant road program, scheduled for the next five years.

"I object to \$250,000 being spent on just 25 miles of roads," he said. "Some 80 per cent of the money is being wasted. It is unnecessary to do anything to our part of West side. We had good roads in our subdivision. Now the widening of it has encouraged speeding. We have ditches we don't need. Besides, I should have been given 30 days' notice that a culvert was to be replaced. I could have installed it myself for a lot less money."

ALTHOUGH STIGLEMAN was the only complainant at the meeting, others have expressed their displeasure over the plan and by letter, village clerk Mrs. Oliver Garwood said.

Former councilman Jack Roberts appeared to suggest revision of ordinance 8 which requires a culvert inspection fee for new homes.

"Actually we're paying twice for the same thing," Roberts maintained.

"Subdividers have to pay for engineers to design and build the new roads. When the village accepts the roads, it is assumed the drainage is correct upon acceptance. So we shouldn't have to pay again when a culvert is installed."

ROBERTS WAS told the \$30 figure is a "voluntary" one and would have to be lived with for a period of time to determine its feasibility.

Mrs. Rogers said the planning board has received either formal or informal requests for rezoning from owners of "almost every piece of property" along 13 Mile from Evergreen to Southfield road, and along Southfield from 13 to Beverly. Most of them are in zoning business zoning, she said.

THE BOARD will make a thorough study of the area—completing the land use study needed for the "do-it-yourself" master plan—before making a recommendation to the village council on O'Neil's rezoning petition. A Detroit attorney, O'Neil also has asked for professional office zoning for land he owns at the 13-Evergreen southwest corner.

"Another thing we are going into is just how much commercial the village needs for tax purposes," Mrs. Rogers said.
