adjacent to the division's general offices and farm machinery research and engineering center, 2500 E. Maple.

A modern American religious art show, "Christ—the King—The Church," opens today at Holy Name school. It's designed to exhibit those works which "embody a deep religious spirit expressed in terms of our times," said W. E. Woolfenden curator in charge of education at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

For the first time in its history, a father and daughter serve as worthy patron and worthy matron of chapter 220 OES, Mrs. Charles Martz and her father David Masterson are the history makers.

William H. Klenke, Jr. becomes the first Marine Reserve General in Michigan. Recently promoted Brigadier General Klegke of Bloomfield Hills, is the senior officer for 2,000 Marines living or stationed in Metropolitan Detroit.

The Maples dropped a surprising one to Port Huron gridders. The Seaholm team was not supposed to have lost as well as it did—25 to 19. The local team had been hit with a rash of injuries and five of its first stringers were out of the play; two others were operating at 50-percent efficiency.

A W. Bloomfield township youth is shot in the neck as he flees Birmingham police at 90 to 95 miles per hour in a stolen Corvette, James P. O'Leary, 15, was struck when a Birmingham police officer tried to hit the tires of the fleeing car that had already put a Bloomfield Hills police car out of commission in the chase south on Woodward. His condition was reported as critical at Beaumont hospital.

A star-filled week for Birmingham as Fred Waring presents his "Stereo Festival" at Seaholm high school, sponsored by the Birmingham Lions club, and Vincent Price speaks in the Town Hall square and takes a tour of the religious art show in Holy Name school gymnasium.

Seaholm high school staged its annual spectacular—Field Day, a curious mixture of silence, noise and unusual field events—three-legged races, barrel and bicycle races, a tug-of-war, and carefully planned cheers.

Kroger executives plan a door-to-door canvass of 30,000 Birmingham area homes. They plan to ask the area homemakers what they like in supermarkets. One group plans to make its rounds in a horse-drawn wagon—a replica of the founder's delivery cart.

Lutheran church of the Shepherd King plans formal dedication of its strikingly modern \$150,000 church at W. Maple and Middlebelt.

Seaholm dropped a heart-breaker to Ferndale, 10-7, on a last-three-minute field goal. The clutch kick showed-up illegal on the film. There were five men in the backfield, and only six on the line. Birmingham, however, didn't protest the game.

An increase in water rates is slated to hit the South Oakland water authority soon. The 12 cent per thousand cubic foot increase imposed by Detroit won't be passed on to member cities until the first of the year. Birmingham will absorb the increase for an indefinite period, according to City Manager L. H. Garza.

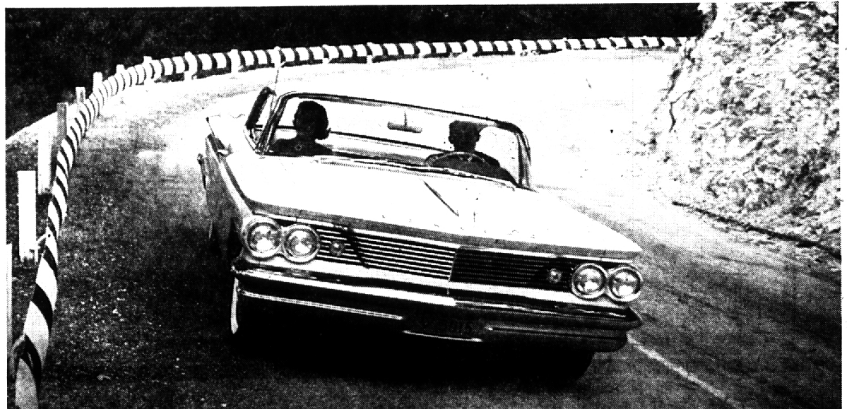
