

Psychology Course Begins Tonight At Cranbrook

The first session of a psychology class, offered through the University of Michigan extension service, will be held tonight at Cranbrook school for Boys, Lone Pine road, Bloomfield Hills.

The class, "The Deviant Personality" will meet from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Registrations will be accepted at the meeting.

The course will deal with the various kinds of emotional disturbances and personality problems that people have, how they develop and how they can be helped.

Dr. John J. Brownstein, lecturer in psychology for U of M and chief of the psychology service at the Dearborn VA hospital, will instruct the course.

FOUR OTHER courses are being offered at Cranbrook by the U of M extension service and further information can be obtained by calling Cranbrook school.

Courses are open to adults who feel they can take the work with profit to themselves. Transcripts of credits are not necessary and credits may be transferred to other colleges.

Students may enroll for undergraduate credit to apply toward a four-year college degree or for graduate work on a masters degree or doctorate program.

The exhibition depicts the land and its produce and the life of the people. All photographs

She spent eight years in Sarawak recording with her camera such things as tropical rain forests, rice paddies, plantations, wild doctors, weavers and family life. The exhibition was first shown in Singapore, and now is being circulated throughout this country by the Smithsonian Institution. Cranbrook Institute of Science is open to visitors daily from 2 to 5 p.m.

To further depress the rates, the policy-holder should have the option of paying the first twenty-five percent of any bill exceeding fifty dollars.
