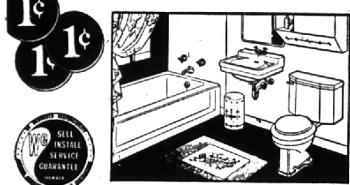

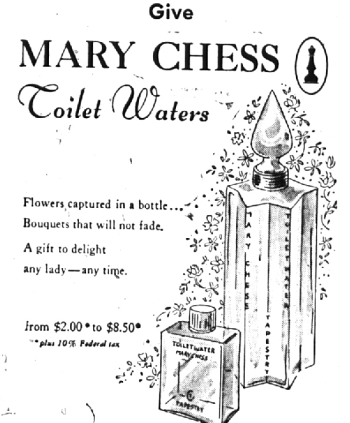

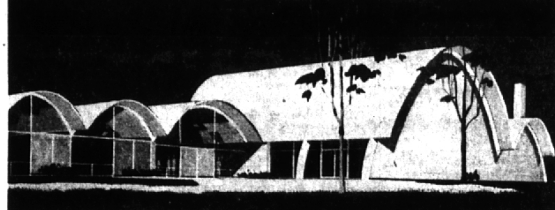

Ground-breaking ceremonies for the new Oakland branch of the YWCA of metropolitan Detroit are scheduled for 2 p.m. Saturday at the corner of Normandy and Woodward roads. Located at the southwest tip of Clawson and bounded on two sides by Royal Oak, the new Oakland YW will be the first branch of the metropolitan Detroit YWCA outside Wayne county. Among the 16 Oakland county communities it will serve are Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Southfield, Franklin and Lathrup. YWCA services to these communities have for the past four years been carried on by the South Oakland Center YW in a small, one-room building in Royal Oak. The new building is scheduled to be ready for use in September. Constructed of face brick and porcelain enamel, the building will be of modern design using the circular ceiling and laminated wood supports to give height and interesting, yet functional, contour. It will be located on a 3.6 acre site. Plans call for offices, a multi-purpose room, social room, club and craft rooms and kitchen, with a patio and barbecue for social activities. A 40-car parking lot and plans for a future gym and swimming pool are included in the drawings. YWCA activities in Oakland county include programs for children and teenage girls, for homemakers and nursery-age tots, for employed adults, for entire families. They range from club and class activities to social affairs for members and their friends.

**3 Slates Face Troy Voters**

Troy voters will find three mayoral and eight commission candidates listed on the ballots when they go to the polls Monday.  
 The candidates, excepting two commission hopefuls, will represent three slates.  
 Representing the Non-Partisan Property Owners slate for the job being vacated by retiring Mayor Frank Costello will be Clarence F. Long, city civil defense director.  
 His running-mates for the two vacant commission seats are August A. Bredell and Murdock Morrison.

LONG, 53, of 1086 E. Sixteen Mile, is a mechanic and has lived in Troy for 29 years. He has served in several appointive city posts and was defeated in the 1955 mayoral primary.  
 Bredell, 50, of 5675 Beech is a former internal revenue service agent. He is presently Michigan chief of real estate for the Federal government's general services administration.  
 Morrison, 58, of 1036 Urbancrest, is a refrigeration mechanic.

**RUNNING FOR MAYOR** on the new Troy Independent Voters council slate is Robert J. Huber, 36, 618 W. Sixteen Mile.  
 Wallace E. Hudson and Vincent McAvoy will accompany him on the slate for commission seats.  
 Huber, owner of the Michigan Chrome and Chemical Company, Detroit, is chairman of the Michigan chapter of the Young President's organization, a member of the world trade committee of the Detroit Board of Commerce and is past national officer of several industrial groups.

HUDSON, 2920 Stonyridge, is president of the Hudson Agency Inc., an insurance agency founded in 1932 by his father.  
 McAvoy, 363 W. Big Beaver, is vice-president of Hubbs Mfg. Co. and manager of the Avon Tube Co. (Cochester).  
 Commissioner Roy L. Duncan is the third candidate for mayoralty. A year-old contractor will head a three-man slate.  
 Seeking commission seats on the same ticket will be Stanley G. Gill.

**Historical Data**  
 1906 Born at Pontiac Now age 52.  
 1925 Completed high school, licensed as a barber, and entered college.  
 1928-9 Elected each year as Constable of the City of Pontiac.  
 1930 Started private law practice in Oakland County.  
 1935 Elected Judge of Pontiac.  
 1937 Proposed and processed administrative changes from old justice to new Municipal Court for Pontiac. New court showed low cost of operation and efficient case disposition.  
 1941 Retired as Pontiac Judge—replaced by two appointees.  
 1943 Entered military service as enlisted man.  
 1946 Chief legal administrator of military establishment when released from service.  
 1946 Unanimously elected State Commander Michigan AMVETS, World War II veterans organization Chartered by Congress.  
 1948 Candidate for Republican nomination as Congressman. Approved by a majority of the Oakland County voters.  
 1950 Requested to be Pontiac's first Director of Public Safety. Served 18 months as Acting Chief of Police. Complimented publicly for his administrative ability and his impartial and courageous enforcement of the law.  
 1954 Established home, with wife and young son, in the Village of Clarkston.  
 1955 Employed as Clarkson Village attorney and still active.  
 1957 Retained as Independence Township attorney and still active.
