SUSAN LOWE is popular with homemakers for her pleasing personality, novel and practical ideas and interesting lectures on food preparation and serving.

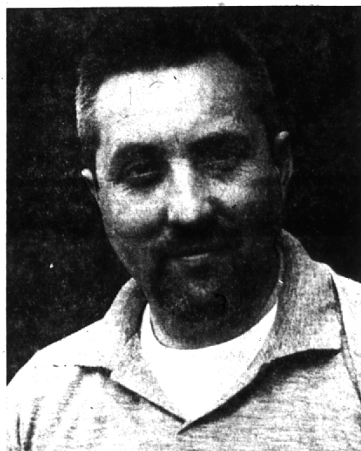
The demonstration will be performed in a model kitchen using all the newest appliances and will be set up in the Birmingham Community House.
