SINNINGEA

(GESNERIACEAE)

The gloxinia, which we have named in the title, is among the showiest of tender, shade-loving summer flowers. They have great velvety leaves and large bell-shaped flowers of single and bi-color shades.

The plants are grown from tubers from now until May in PEAT MOSS or VERMICULITE and POTTING SOIL in PERMANENT PLANT TRAYS, clay saucers or pots.

When developed the temperature should never drop below 60 degrees. Summer shade is essential. In August the rest period begins; repotting of the tubers should be done every third year if necessary.

For fun, propagation can be done from seed or leaf cuttings.

(BEGONIACEAE)

Obviously the Begonia. Yes! But specifically the TUBEROUS-ROOTED DOUBLE CAMELIA FLOWERED begonia.

These tubers, with simple but thoughtful care, can give you some of the most spectacular, beautiful colors and flowers that one can have indoors—and outdoors in proper location.

They are easy to start, like the gloxinia, but unlike the gloxinia in that they do beautifully in shaded areas in the yard—moderate or deep shade.

Their culture is simple, their tolerance to soil conditions amazing, their range of shade conditions wide, and the starting of the tubers a cinch.

Come in and see the pictures, pinch (not too hard) the tubers, get some information and after buying a few go home and enjoy a new and beautiful experience.
