Birmingham runners chalked up a first and a third and set two new school records in the high school section of the Michigan AAU indoor track and field meet at the University of Michigan recently.

The 800-yard relay team of Dick Zamo, Mark Hall, Les Danielson and Bob Kulow scored a first in 1:50.0, breaking the old mark of 1:56.4 set by Maples Hall, Danielson, Kulow and Doug Booth at the Huron relays in Toledo, 1958.

Les Danielson had the best individual time.
