An architect and designer in Michigan for the past 32 years, William H. Kuni, 69, died Monday in Receiving hospital. Kuni, of 576 Chester street, Birmingham, who had designed many of the large homes in the area, was graduated from William Penn Charter school and then studied under several architects in the East before coming to Detroit in 1912. In 1934, he formed William H. Kuni, Inc., following his registration in Michigan as an architect in 1927. Between 1942 and 1945, he was the senior engineer on the staff of Lt. Col. James A. Kendrick of the Corps of Engineers at Fort Wayne Ordnance Depot.

In 1947, he returned to private practice and specialized in large residences in the area. He was a member of the American Institute of Architects, F&AM, Moslem Temple, Engineering Society of Detroit, Consistory, Village Players of Birmingham and Detroit Yacht club.

Surviving are two sons, William H., Jr., and Wayne D.; a stepson, William R. Joy; a sister and seven grandchildren.

Services will be today at 2:30 p.m. from the William R. Hamilton Co., 3975 Cass, Detroit, under the auspices of Ashlar lodge No. 91, F&AM. Burial will follow in Grandview cemetery.

Jan. Traffic Toll Increases 100%

Birmingham's traffic accident toll for last month increased 100 per cent over the same period in 1958 to make it one of the worst Januarys on record.

A total of 85 accidents were recorded as compared to 44 last year. Personal injury accidents increased to 19 from 7 one year ago and the number of persons injured increased from 10 to 25.

ESTIMATED property damage for the month was \$29,723 as compared to \$16,453 for January, 1958. Police chief Ralph W. Moxley said two violations continue to be the main contributing cause to accidents. Right-of-way violations accounted for 32 accidents, and following-too-closely caused 29.

"Right-of-way violations include those accidents caused by motorists stopping improperly from parked positions and driving into through streets from side streets, alleys and driveways without yielding the right-of-way," Moxley said.

Following too-closely includes accidents caused by the motorist failing to provide safe stopping distance between his car and the vehicle ahead.

"THIS TYPE of accident always increases when pavements are icy and stopping distances are increased," he said.

Chief Moxley warned that there is still winter weather ahead and motorists should consider the problem and check pavement conditions carefully before driving at their normal speed or legally posted speed.

He also pointed out that the stopping distance of a car can increase as much as ten times the stopping distance required on dry pavement if there are extreme icy conditions.
