Four Cranbrook seniors were recently commended by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation for their high performances on the national tests.

Those honored are: Tom Waylett, Bill McQueen, Ron Rieder, and Jim Kimball.

This honor means that these four will receive a letter of commendation showing that they are in the top two or three per cent of all students in the country. Needless to say, this letter is a great help in getting into the college of one's choice.

As is the custom, Cranbrook changed its lower school prefects at the semester mark and two new prefects were assigned their duties.

Replacing Lee MacBride and Bill McQueen, the job of maintaining order and providing leadership are Ben Aurand and Kim Morris.

During the first semester, two chosen seniors are given this responsibility over the seventh and eighth grades. They are then re-elected in the second half of the year because of the great amount of work that is involved.

The annual Time Current Events tests were recently given at Cranbrook. This contest, sponsored by Time Magazine, tests what knowledge a student has concerning what has been going on in the world during the past year. There are 105 multiple points on the test.

The all-school prize this year was a tie between senior Royal Ingersoll and sophomore Jeff Mitchell; both got 104 out of 105. Breaking the previous high for the school which was 102, a record that had stood for about fifteen years.

Prices also went to senior Tom Ruth with 101, juniors Mitch Grayson, John Hartman, and Ted Bull, all with 100. Sophomore Steve Brown also had 100 and therefore figured in the winnings. All those above have the choice of several excellent books as awards from Time Magazine.

This year's test was considerably easier than past tests. Usually the high scores have ranged in the low 80's. This year, however, that was not true.

Cranbrook's much publicized Foreign A-Fair, designed to raise money for the foreign student fund, will be held this Saturday night from 7 to 9 p.m. in the school auditorium.

Detroit Country Day Debaters Win Championship

the balmy climate of Barbados, we exhort you to get off your snow shoveling activities and to begin your preparation for a season of beauty (excuse me while I scratch my sunburn) and fun in your back yard.

- 1.—Clean all dirty tools, put good edges on the cutting tools, throw away all the liquid insecticides and herbicides you let freeze despite our advice.
- 2.—Special seed requirements should be ordered now. ROSE orders may and should be placed now. We have a descriptive catalogue of the varieties of packaged roses we will have this Spring. We are not planning to have too many, because we hate to throw them away.
- 3.—If thaws occur this month, you might try spraying the chickweed patches with 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T. Fertilizer can be applied anytime you can do it—if you want to do it. Use 2 lbs. of 10-6-4 to 100 sq. ft.
- 4.—This—just a minute until I get my foot off this Sea Urchin, ugly! Worse than crabgrass! This time can be put to good use by pruning grape vines, fruit trees and shade trees. Use good sharp tools and don't climb up ladders—get a BARTLETT POLE PRUNER & SAW COMBINATION.

Don't do any pruning unless you know what you are trying to accomplish.

- 5.—Arrange to have elm trees over 12 ft. high sprayed for Dutch Elm disease by a professional. You can handle small trees yourself with DD-DIE. Direction at the shop.
- 6.—Look over trunks and branches of fruit and shade trees for egg masses of Tent Caterpillars and Bagworms. Remove anything that looks like eggs—EXCEPT—OVAL SHAPED EGGS ON FINE TWIGGS. These eggs will produce good lugs which will eat bad bugs.
