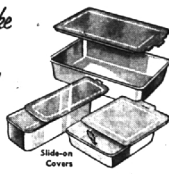

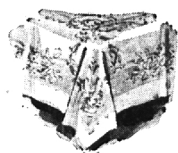

# BOOKS and REVIEWS

## The Search

By C. P. Snow. 343 pp. New York, Charles Scribner's Sons. \$3.95.

One of the many repercussions of Sputnik I has been the focus of attention on the scientist and on the cultural divide between the scientific and non-scientific worlds. This divide has existed for years—along with the dangerous misconceptions each world holds for the other—but never before has the need for communication been more urgent or more widely recognized. In his preface, British novelist C. P. Snow explains that he has revised "The Search" written in 1934 for present publication, with the hope of "showing the non-scientific world what the scientific world is all about."

I. I. Rabi, a Nobel prize-winning physicist, who once wrote, "writers write about scientists as if they were men of Mars or earnest boy scouts," has said of "The Search": "This is one novel which (is) really about scientists living as scientists."

THE story concerns the life and career of physicist Arthur Miles whose love for science began as a child. With scholarship aid, Arthur goes to King's College. On the basis of his outstanding record and some successful experiments in crystallography, Arthur is invited to continue his work at Cambridge after graduation. While there he falls in love with a young girl, through whom we see Arthur's persistent and often conflicting interest in the personal, as opposed to the scientific.

However, as each step of his career falls into place, his preoccupation with science is unrelenting. His dream of directing research in the unknown area of protein structure is seemingly assured when he is finally proposed as director of a new laboratory.

THE MOST important part of the book concerns this last and most crucial step in his career. Five scientists are appointed to select the chairman. These committee meetings degenerate into a very human struggle for power revealing the extent to which science, like everything else, is influenced by personality, politics, and group pressures.

At the same time, Arthur is made to realize the decision, regardless of the men or means used in reaching it, is necessitated and justified by the detachment required for true progress in science. The outcome also represents the climax in Arthur's life as a human being, as well as a scientist. As he is forced to reappraise his life and relationship to science, he

arrives for the first time at self-knowledge.

ALTHOUGH a novelist for 20 years, the author was trained as a physicist in college and has worked continuously in some scientific capacity throughout his career. Like his hero, he seems to possess the same passion for "the human things" above and beyond his love for science.

This does not detract from the scientific insight provided. It is not always possible to understand the nature of the experiments, but you do feel the excitement and tension involved in discovery. And you do get a picture of the strength, limitations and aims of scientists—some of which are peculiar to science and some of which are shared by all men. This being the author's alleged purpose, I think he has realized it.

I DO think, however, it is primarily a story of the development of a person and only secondarily a representation of a scientist at work.

On either count, it is an important and memorable book.

LANSING—State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie will officially open a new district office building at Pontiac March 10.

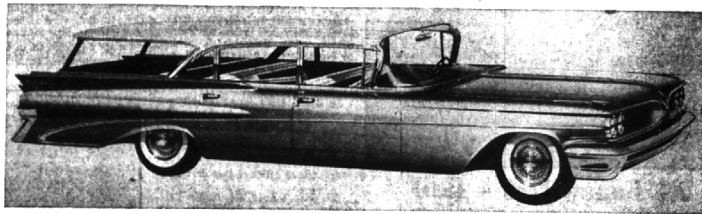
Forty district personnel have already started operations at the new site after being transferred from the department's Redford office.

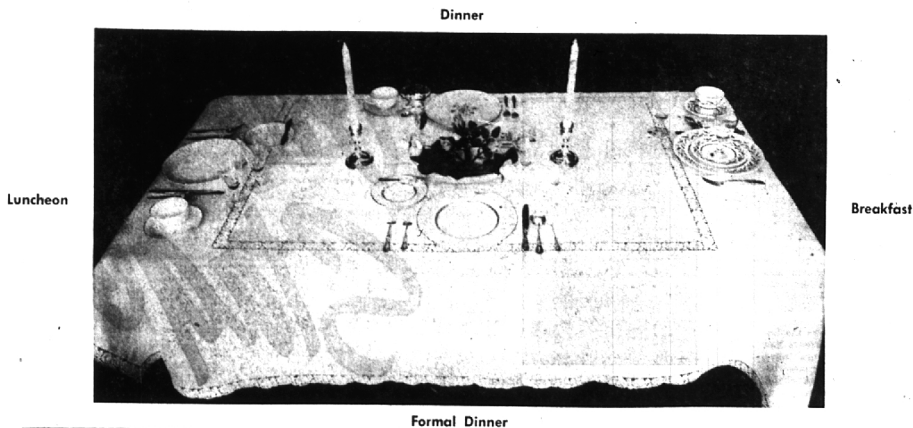
