Michigan contributed a total of \$6,699.25 as compared to second place Illinois \$6,775.25.

### ORDINANCE NO. 544

#### CITY OF BIRMINGHAM

#### AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 527

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.3 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 527 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, AND THE ZONING MAP, BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 3.3-9.

The City of Birmingham Ordains:

Section 1. That Section 3.3 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527 be amended by addition of a section to be known as Section 3.3-9, said Section to read as follows:

Section 3.3-9. Property located at the southwest corner of Woodward and Redding described as Lots 1 to 9, inclusive and Lot 47 of Replat of Easterly Part of Quanton Lake Estates Subdivision shall be changed from its present classification of R-6 Multiple-Family Residential Zone District, to R-5 Multiple-Family Residential Zone District.

Section 2. The Zoning Map attached to Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.

Ordained by the Commission of the City of Birmingham this 9th day of February, 1959, to be effective upon publication.

Bloomfield Hills, which dropped a heartbreaker to Clarkstonville Friday, 56-54, in double, sudden-death overtime, has two tough games ahead.

The Barons return to the friendly confines of their home court to host Clarkston tomorrow night and Dearborn on Tuesday.

CLARKSTON bowed to the Barons, 56-50, January 21, but Cranbrook holds a 55-48 decision over them from January 13.

The Barons snapped out of their slump temporarily Tuesday with a solid 45-34 win over Madison Lamphere. Bob Thompson led the winners with 10 points and teammates Bob Barrett and Doug Duziger add nine each.

## Farmington To Invade Southfield

What's happened to Southfield? Many partisan Jay fans are asking that question following two straight defeats.

And the end isn't in sight yet. The Jays host Farmington tomorrow night and the visitors already hold a 62-58 decision over the locals.
