**Public Is Loser On Murrow 'Trip'**

The television public has recently been informed that CBS will replace outstanding news analyst Edward R. Murrow this year with Arthur Godfrey on "Person to Person"; and that the fine series "See It Now" will be discontinued indefinitely. It has been stated by Mr. Murrow that he is leaving voluntarily for a year's absence—that he is anxious to "travel and think" without the inevitable broadcast deadline.

The question remains in our mind whether this decision to suspend broadcasting for CBS is, as it appears to be on the surface, a purely personal decision by Murrow or one that may have been forced by a disagreement with the network.

It seems that Mr. Murrow is for the moment considered expendable by CBS policy makers. He has the embarrassing habit of going into issues more deeply and more forthrightly than has almost any other commentator on TV. He is not a man easily swayed by the fears

and interests of advertisers — he has been, in a word, above compromise.

UNFORTUNATELY there doesn't appear to be much room for many individuals of this caliber in TV. We have copious amounts of the give-away; the violent private-eye with his immature sexual encounters; the western, deduced even of its old chestnut values; and the stale movie—some of them so poor that they are only a few men like Murrow have tried from time to time to crack the mediocrity barrier and program with the conviction that the public is discriminating. For the health of TV generally, it should be obvious to both network and public that neither can afford to let Murrow go.

In defense of Mr. Godfrey, although his one-time freshness has deteriorated in the last few seasons, he has functioned effectively enough as the MC of several important clatter-and-fausts apparently dear to a large segment of the public's heart.

HE HAS strayed only a few times into more controversial regions when making certain qualified statements about our defense appropriations. He also gained headlines some time ago by accusing a member of his company of "not enough humility," the lack of which has never been apparent in Godfrey — Julius LaRosa is doing nicely, too.

Despite these colorful asides, I doubt that even Arthur Godfrey feels he can in any way fill the vacuum produced by Ed Murrow's leaving.

Perhaps the public, you and I, are the key to this matter. For in the last analysis, the producers and advertisers know that they must seek viewers, what they want.

THIS IS to say that although Arthur Godfrey can sell soap, it must be obvious that a thinking, perceptive, honest reporter is being replaced if only temporarily by a purveyor of those qualities that make TV what it is today—flat, stale and apparently very profitable.

The blame for this lies equally with network and public if all of us sit complacently by and let it happen.

A water main construction program scheduled to begin this spring in Troy may be put off until 1960 because of inadequate city funds.

Commissioners decided to study the feasibility of a seven-month issue after City Manager C. R. Lukens told commissioners Monday night that the city would only have about \$200,000 to put into the 1959 program.

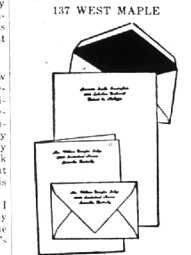
POLICE SAID he used false identification when asked to produce credentials. His examination date was set for Friday, March 13.
