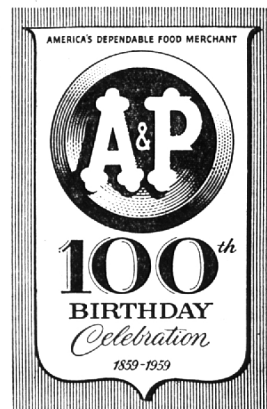

The evening began at 7 p.m. The A-Fair proper continued until 9:00. During that time fourteen different groups had booths, some more than one. A few were stalls for the sale of unusual foods, pastries, or candies. Most booths, however, pitted the participant against the concession, the booth usually winning. This continued to 9 when most went to Cranbrook's large gym.

The evening continued until 10:30. The Detroit disc jockey, presided over a dance featuring both popular music and some old favorites. This dance lasted until 10:30. A few more cents was required to get in, much additional money was raised.

The whole A-Fair ended at 11:00. All in all it was considered an excellent event.

Eight boys won the relay races: Larry McKenny, Tom Kennedy, Bill McCurdy and Larry Kimberly in the medley relay and Brian Ogris, Gary Weick, Cliff Williams, and Don Morris in the freestyle relay.

Lee Driver is the only boy still at Derby holding any swimming records. Lee swam the 50-yard breaststroke in 1:36.2; the 100-yard breaststroke in 1:18.1; and holds second place in a medley relay that took 2:14.2.
