## Starving Deer Tolls Are Heavy

**LANSING, Feb. 26** — Starved deer were found in Isosco, Gogebic, Crawford, Roscommon, Ogemaw, Lake, and Presque Isle counties last week—first reported victims of the toughest winter in years.

States game biologists, meeting at Higgins Lake last week, confirmed the starvation reports and agreed that loss of deer means a storm signal for a serious tornado yet to come.

**TEMPERATURES** have been far below normal and snow falls have been heavy throughout most of Michigan's northern deer range. Also, storms have kept timbering operations at a minimum, so that deer, which normally feed on tops and twigs left by loggers, have been denied even this source of food.

Deer in pens at Houghton Lake wildlife experiment station had to be as much weight by mid-February this year as they had to last March. In other words, they have had much less body fat to carry them through the remaining weeks of winter.

**IN ADDITION**, they have eaten 50 per cent more than normal. The deer are fed all they want of a typical mixed-food deeryard diet. Deer in the wild are not, however, so fortunately supplied with food; their weight losses, if anything, will be higher.

Game men planned increased cutting programs as one immediate answer and called for public support of special deer seasons as the long-range solution to deer starvation problems.
