## Annual Report Shows Crimes Rising Here

The Birmingham police department 1958 annual report released this week shows a 16 per cent increase in major crimes over the 1955-56-57 level.

The largest increase was in auto thefts and larcenies. There was a total of 31 automobile thefts last year and 357 larceny offenses were recorded.

There were no homicides as compared to an average of one per year since 1955. Three robberies were recorded as compared to only one per year during the three previous years.

JUVENILE ARRESTS rose approximately 2 per cent over the previous three year average.

A total of 199 juveniles were arrested, which is less than three per cent of the estimated 7,000 young persons under the age of 17 residing in the city.

Increases were noted in arrests of juveniles for robbery, burglary, larceny, auto theft and malicious destruction of property.

A decrease was noted in arrests for taking a car without an owner's permission, aggravated assault, carrying concealed weapons and disorderly conduct.

Of the 199 juveniles arrested, 118 were local residents. This was an increase of 22 over 1957. Out-of-town juvenile arrests dropped from 195 in 1957 to 81 last year.

JUVENILE traffic violators increased from 192 in 1957 to 204 last year. Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said this increase could be partly attributed to the increase of young drivers in the city.

A total of 92 violators were handled in the 11 sessions of the Teen Age Traffic court, created in 1957.

The traffic picture here was highlighted by the fact that there wasn't one fatal accident in the city during 1958, making Birmingham one of three communities in the country, of its size, to accomplish such a record.

Traffic accidents were reduced approximately 6.8 percent over the 1955-56-57 level, but personal injury accidents increased 6 per cent.

## Commission Denies Re-Zoning Request

A rezoning request by Charles J. Van Horn, who asked a change from residential to parking in the Island View drive area, was denied Monday night by city commissioners.

The commission upheld the plan board's recommendation and asked the city manager's office to make a study of a proposal to have a municipal parking lot in the area.

MANY RESIDENTS of Brookside drive claim that Van Horn has no title to the property at the rear of the Reid building and that it is city property.

City Attorney James Howlett said there is no actual title to the land, but that a "great deal of complex information shows that Van Horn does own the property."

The plan board report said the creation of a municipal parking lot and special assessment district in the area was the only reasonable solution to present and future parking problems.
