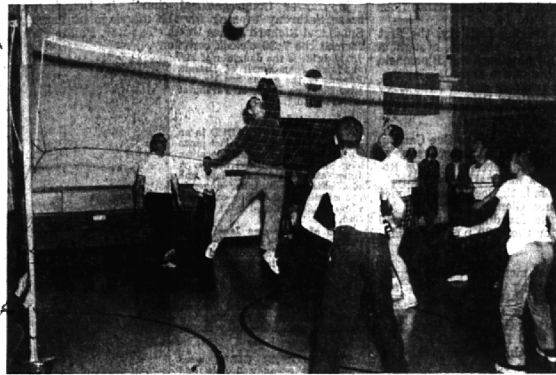


Students, Teachers Battle in Volleyball
