Storms Center Over Lathrup Difficulties

LATHRUP — In spite of snow and icicles outside Monday evening, Lathrup council members once more began to hear the soft lap of storm waters at their doorstep.

Packaged in the agenda was an appointment to the storm water advisory committee, a letter from Harold K. Schone, director of the Oakland County DPW and Evergreen interceptor project, and a proposed schedule of events for Mayor Richard N. Cogger. The schedule included problems to be faced before residents vote a second time on a bond issue for storm sewers.

The council approved the appointment of Elmore J. Leonard, 17450 Redwood, to the storm water advisory committee. The status of J. Clifton Lorne, no longer a Lathrup resident, was changed from regular committee member to advisory.

WHEN LATHRUP residents turned down the bond issue for a separate storm sewer system last Feb., the council formed a citizens' committee to study the problem again with engineers, council members and authorities. The committee has held ten meetings since last Sept. Cogger told council members that their investigation is completed, and he is awaiting their recommendations.

A letter from Schone read at Monday's council meeting said a March 1 starting date has been set for the Evergreen interceptor. Schone stated March, 1959 has been set for completion.

WHEN LATHRUP joins the interceptor, all storm water will have to be cut from the system. Even with downspouts disconnected, the city will face serious flooding dangers without adequate storm water drainage.

The council's schedule of events must cover all action necessary so that the city will be ready when the interceptor is complete.

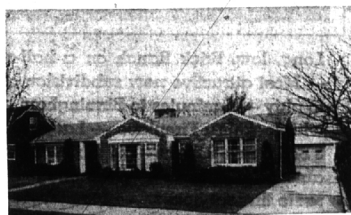

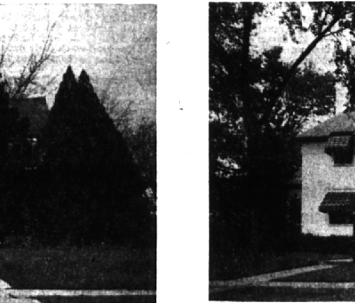
