ORDINANCE NO. 21

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 4 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION FOR MOTOR VEHICLES AND OTHER VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES; TO DEFINE DUTIES WHEN ACCIDENTS OCCUR; TO PROVIDE FOR ADMINISTRATION; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE."

The Village of Westwood Ordains:

Section 1.01. Section 34 of Ordinance No. 4 of the Village of Westwood entitled "An Ordinance To Provide For the Regulation For Motor Vehicles and Other Vehicles; To Provide For Pedestrian Rights and Duties; To Define Duties When Accidents Occur; To Provide for Administration; and To Provide Penalties for Violation of Any of the Provisions of This Ordinance" be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

"Section 34. Careless and Reckless Driving.

(a) Any person who drives any vehicle upon a highway or a frozen public stream or pond or other place open to the general public, including any area designated for the parking of motor vehicles within the limits of this Village without due caution and circumspection, and at a speed or in a manner as to endanger any person or property, shall be guilty of careless driving.

(b) Any person who drives any vehicle upon a highway or a frozen public stream or pond or other place open to the general public, including any area designated for the parking of motor vehicles within the limits of this Village, carelessly and heedlessly, in willful and wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others, shall be guilty of reckless driving."

Section 2.01. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3.01. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days from its publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 22

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE MAXIMUM WEIGHT OF VEHICLES TRAVELING ON THE STREETS UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

The Village of Westwood Ordains:

Section 1. Definitions.

(a) "Maximum Axle Load" means the gross weight over the axle which includes vehicles and load.

Section 2. Weight Limitations.

(a) In no case shall the maximum axle load of any vehicle traveling on any of the public streets under the jurisdiction of the Village of Westwood exceed the maximum weights set forth in the following provisions which prescribe the distance between axles:

(1) When the axle spacing is 9 feet or over between axles, the maximum axle load shall not exceed 18,000 pounds for vehicles equipped with high pressure pneumatic or balloon tires.

(2) When the axle spacing is less than 9 feet between 2 axles but more than 3 1/2 feet, the maximum axle load shall not exceed 15,000 pounds for high pressure pneumatic or balloon tires.

(3) When 2 axles are spaced less than 3 1/2 feet apart the combined weight thereof shall not exceed the maximum weights as specified for a single axle when spaced 9 feet or more apart.

(4) The foregoing shall be known as the normal loading maximum.

(b) When such normal loading is in effect, the Village Council shall have the authority to designate certain highways or sections thereof where bridges are in need of repair or where heavier loading, which designation shall be revised as needed on which the maximum tandem axle assembly loading shall not exceed 16,000 pounds for any such assembly.

(c) On any legal combination of vehicles, only 1 tandem axle assembly shall be permitted on such designated highways at the gross permissible weight of 16,000 pounds for any such axle and no other tandem axle assembly on such combination of vehicles shall exceed a gross weight of 15,000 pounds for any such axle.

(d) The normal size of tires shall be the rated size as published by the manufacturers and in no case shall the maximum wheel load permissible for any wheel exceed 700 pounds per inch of width of tire.

(e) During the months of March, April and May in each year, the maximum axle load allowable on concrete pavements, or pavements with a concrete base, shall be reduced by 25% from the maximum axle loads as specified herebefore in this chapter and the maximum axle loads allowable on all other types of roads during these months shall be reduced by 35% from the maximum axle loads as herein specified. The maximum wheel load shall not exceed 525 pounds per inch of tire width on concrete and concrete base or 450 pounds per inch of tire width on all other roads during the period the seasonal road restrictions are in effect.

(f) The Road Commissioner or the Director of Public Safety in his absence or disability may suspend the restrictions imposed by this section when and where in his discretion conditions of the streets so warrant and may impose the restricted loading requirements of this section on designated streets at any other time that the conditions of the street may require or he may prohibit the operation of trucks or other commercial vehicles on designated streets, provided however, that such prohibitions shall be designated by appropriate signs placed on such streets.

Section 3. Information on Vehicles.

(a) All motor trucks, tractors, trailers or semi-trailers, except as hereinafter provided in paragraph (b) of this section, of more than 2500 pounds weight now operating or hereafter placed in operation upon the public streets under the jurisdiction of the Village of Westwood shall have painted upon the information relative to their width, tire gauge, width over all, length, weight and carrying capacity, and name and address of registered owner of vehicle in letters at least 1 inch in height. This information shall be conspicuously placed upon the vehicle.

(b) This section shall not apply to trucks eligible for and equipped with farm commercial license plates.

Section 4. Authority to Require Weighing of Vehicles: Penalties.

(a) Any public safety officer of the Village of Westwood, having reason to believe that the weight of a vehicle and load is unlawful, may require the driver to stop and submit to a weighing of the same by means of either portable or stationary scales, and may require that such vehicle be driven to the nearest weighing station of the state highway department for the purpose of allowing said officer to determine whether such conveyance is loaded in conformity with the provisions of this chapter.

(b) Whenever the said officer upon weighing of vehicle and load, as above provided, determines that the weight is unlawful, such officer may require the driver to stop the vehicle in a suitable place and remain standing until such portion of the load is removed as may be necessary to reduce the gross weight of such vehicle to such limit as permitted under this chapter. All material so unloaded shall be cared for by the owner or operator of such vehicle at the risk of such owner or operator.

(c) Any owner of any vehicle, or any lessee, who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be assessed a fine of not more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 5. Special Permits.

(a) The Road Commissioner may in his discretion, upon application in writing and good cause being shown therefor, issue a special permit in writing authorizing the applicant to operate or remove a vehicle or combination of vehicles of a size or weight of vehicle or load exceeding the maximum specified in this ordinance upon any public street under the jurisdiction of the Village of Westwood.

(b) The application for any special permit shall be on a form prescribed by the Road Commissioner and shall specifically describe the vehicle or vehicles and load to be operated thereon and the particular streets upon which permit to operate is requested.

(c) Every such permit shall be carried in the vehicle or combination of vehicles to which it refers and shall be open to inspection by any public safety officer or the Road Commissioner, and no person shall violate any of the terms and conditions of such permit.

Section 6. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 10 days after its publication.
