

High Twelve Founder To Be Guest Speaker

The founder of High Twelve International, Rev. E. C. Wolcott, nationally known for his work with various church, youth and civic projects, will be in Birmingham Sunday and Monday.

Presently executive director of High Twelve International, Mr. Wolcott will speak on "This Is My Task" at the 11 a.m. service Sunday at the Birmingham Congregational church.

Monday he will be the guest speaker at the regular 6:30 p.m. meeting of the Birmingham High Twelve club at the Community House.

Delegates from High Twelve groups throughout the state are expected to attend the meeting. One group is coming here from Duluth, Ohio.

The 74-year-old former Iowa farm boy has worked with various groups in the United States, and has been especially interested in youth work.

From 1907 to 1910 he was pastor of the Mayflower Congregational church. While there he held night classes for Greek boys employed in shoe shine parlors.

HE WAS the first Boy Scout Commissioner appointed in Iowa, was midwest chairman of the YMCA and director of older boys' work for Iowa and Illinois.

He served as regional director of Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota United Church fund raising drives and Inter Church World campaigns.

BETWEEN 1923 and 1942 he was active in private business. He was vice president of several insurance companies and general manager of the Blue Valley Creamery Company of Chicago.

In 1942 he began organizing work with High Twelve International. He started 124 of the present clubs and reorganized 60 clubs that failed to reorganize after being chartered. He has been editor of "High Twelve" magazine since 1948.

He was secretary of High Twelve International from 1921 to 1923 and president from 1921 to 1923 and 1925 to 1926. He has been executive director since 1936.

During the past two years he has acted as interim pastor at two Congregational churches.
