State May Liquidate Vets' Fund

The good old State of Michigan is broke. It is operating its government in the economic chaos of red ink. By the end of next June, we are told by state officials, Michi-

June, we are told by state officials, Michigan will by a hundred million dollars in the red in a state of Michigan must find ways to get more money and the only way to get this money is to reach into the pockets of Michigan citizens by way of new taxes. Already the findings of a citizens' tax commission have been made known to the public. The chief recompendation of this

public. The chief recommendation of this report favors the enactment of legislation impose an income tax upon Michigan

This income tax plan has not been approved by a majority of the members of the State Legislature which convened Jan-uary 2nd, neither has Governor Williams placed his stamp of approval upon the idea. The particular type of an income tax suggested in this report is the graduated kind, which levies a lesser rate upon smaller incomes and an increasingly higher rate upon larger incomes. The maximum on the latter would not exceed 8% of a person's annual income

TWICE WITHIN the past generation, Michigan citizens have been asked to vote on the proposition of changing the State's constitution to legalize the imposition of a graduated income tax. Twice the plan has been defeated by overwhelming maiorities.

Most lawyers have always held that the present Michigan Constitution prohibits the imposition of a graduated income tax, holding that only a uniform tax rate can be levied. There is no doubt but what a great deal of consideration and discussion of the citizens' tax commission report will take place over in Lansing after the first of the year.

There are those who vigorously favor the suggested income tax pattern of a graduated tax; at the same time, there are many who vigorously oppose the idea. Indeed, any income tax at all wins plenty of official and citizen opposition.

POLITICS BEING what it is and politicians being what they are, history shows that when unlimited powers of taxation are given to a legislative body, eventually it will find ways to increase, increase and increase the percentage of the tax to be levied upon incomes. Just as in the case

of the Federal government of this country. It is axiomatic that no unit of government is any stronger than the amount of money it has at its disposal. Many citizens believe that a graduated income tax in the State of Michigan will be like turning over to their state officials the keys to their

safety deposit boxes.

There is, of course, one available source of ready money now owned by the state of Michigan. It is the 50 million dollars which lies in a Michigan veterans' trust fund, the income from which provides a variety of aids to Michigan war veterans.

THIS 50 MILLION dollars was put in THIS 50 MILLION dollars was put in the fund at the request of former Governor Harry Kelly more than a dozen years ago, at a time when the State of Michigan really had many millions of dollars which it did not need in order to carry on its current activities of that time.

To retain this 50 million dollars of the people's means, in such a fund is not in people's means, in such a fund is not in

To retain this 50 million dollars of the people's money in such a fund is not in keeping with the traditional method of providing cash for the State's, various programs. It seems to us that this veterans' trust fund should be liquidated and the cash put into the State's general fund. The need for cash to help our veterans should be included in the State's annual budget, the same as for the State agen. budget, the same as for other State agenorders, the same as for other State agen-cies. Considerable opposition, of course, to the turning over of the 50 million dollars to the State's general fund will be made, should such a plan get into the State's legislative hopper.

SEVERAL TIMES during past years, the Legislature has discussed the liquidation of this veterans' trust fund and it proceeds put into the State's general fund, but each time the idea was abandoned. Now, however, with the State in greater financial trouble than for many years, it would not surprise many chestrages of the would not surprise many observers of the Lansing scene if the Legislature, aided by the Governor, should place this trust fund in the general fund of the State of Michigan. It certainly would provide partial relief for the State's current financial problems.

As for the future of the needs of Mich-

igan veterans, their cause is deserving of unceasing attention, of course. The public of Michigan, we believe, would rise to the annual need to provide funds for this aid—and few Legislators may be expected to oppose sufficient funds for carrying out this program.
