Watrous Aims For 3rd PGA Q-C Tourney

Al Watrous, of Birmingham, will shoot for his third straight PGA Quarter Century club title in the tournament restricted to PGA members of 25 years standing. He's the only man ever to win the Quarter Century event two times, Feb. 11-12, at Dundelin, Pa.

Sponsoring the \$5,000 program will be the First Flight company, formerly the National Golf company of America, of Chattanooga, Tenn., and the PGA of America.

In addition to and preceding the 36-hole competition, there will be a Senior/Junior four-ball best-ball event, with a prize list of \$1,600.00. It will be played on Monday, February 16.

BACK TO challenge Watrous, is expected, will be the three men who have won the Quarter Century Club champions, Jules Blanton of West Palm Beach, Fla., Harry Cooper of White Plains, N.Y., and Louis Chiappetta of Sylvania, Ohio.

Hanton won the first tournament in 1954. Cooper took the third in 1955. Chiappetta made the third in 1956.

A field of upwards of 100 PGA members is expected to tee off for the first time in the tournament. Some 400 PGA members are eligible to compete.

The chief challengers to Watrous will be Dick Metz, 1908 Texas Section PGA Seniors' Champion at Clear Spring, Md., and terminal in the last match-play PGA Championship in 1957. They will play Michigan State University at East Lansing in 1959.

Ice Fishermen Warned About Cars on Lakes

ANN ARBOR—Ice fishermen who drive their automobiles over frozen lakes are being warned of danger, even if the ice is "thick."

Information supplied by the Michigan state laboratories at the University of Michigan indicates that a vehicle moving across ice produces a traveling wave of ice all around it.

The ice is pushed down or deformed beneath the vehicle. Moving progressively away from the car there is a point of no deflection, then an upheaval of the ice, and finally a gradual return to normal.

OF COURSE, the deflection and upheaval amount to less than an inch of change. But under certain conditions—say, when the water is very deep—this flexing will break the ice and put the car in the water.

The U-M meteorologists have a few words to say, too, about how the ice is formed. As the water in the lake cools, it becomes denser and goes to the bottom, exchanging places with warmer and lighter water. This keeps on until all the water is about 34 degrees.

At that temperature the maximum density of water occurs, and as the liquid cools further, it becomes lighter instead of heavier. The water on the surface stays there and continues to cool. In natural lakes, it might cool to one degree below zero before it freezes.
