Change Orders. Cut School Cost Below Original Budget

The Birmingham board of education Tuesday night approved change orders which will cut the cost of the new Junior-Senior high school \$390,168. This will mean the school will cost \$17,186 less than the total budget of \$3,836,000, approved in April of 1958.
 The change orders were the result of a request by the board in October of 1958, when architect Linn Smith, of Smith Tarapata & MacMahon, eliminate \$370,900 worth of specifications from the cost.
 The board made the request because low bids received were \$370,000 over Smith's estimates. Smith said the reason for the low estimate was his basic error in leaving out the cost of 16,000 square feet of overhangs, tunnels, etc., that were in the specifications and on which bids were made.

Troy News Briefs

School Bus Drivers Get Minimum Pay

The Troy school board last week approved paying school bus drivers the full morning driving pay for the hours and 15 minutes on days when buses fail to start.
 The problem arose when all Troy schools were closed Jan. 5 because of the extremely cold weather. Only two of the 14 buses could be started.
 The drivers rejected an earlier plan to give them a one hour minimum pay on mornings when buses failed to start.
 Superintendent Rex B. Smith recommended the approved plan to the board. He said that drivers he assigned to work on the buses or in the schools during such mornings.

Czarnowski, Troy's Plan Commissioner

John C. Czarnowski last week was accepted as Troy plan commissioner following the commission's refusal to reconsider their rejection of Peter K. Rikheim.
 Czarnowski, Mayor Frank Costello's second nomination, is a supporter of candidates opposing the commission majority, as is Rikheim.

2nd Troy Candidate Files for Mayor

City Commissioner Roy L. Duncan last week became the second Troy man to file as a candidate for mayor.
 He filed Friday along with commission hopefuls Stanley G. Gill and William R. Jenkins.
 The first candidate to file for the job being vacated by retiring mayor Frank Costello was Robert J. Huber.
 A third candidate, Clarence F. Long is expected to drop out. If he does and there are no other candidates there will not be a mayoral primary Feb. 15.
