Rek Officials Solve Touchy Rink Problem

Recreation department officials, aided by an additional \$1,000 from the city, solved a touchy problem at the city's three natural ice rinks last week.
Parents of small children were complaining that hockey players were taking up the rinks and that children were endangered by flying pucks.
ONE LITTLE girl was injured three weeks ago when struck in the face by a puck.
The city commission gave the recreation department an additional \$1,000 last week to maintain the ice rinks after the budget was nearly exhausted.
A 10-foot fence was erected across St. James rink which gave little children two-thirds of the skating surface.
Two goalie nets were placed against each side of the smaller part of the rink for the hockey players.
A RECREATION department official said spot checks show the children now are extremely happy with the new arrangement.
"The skaters are happy to be separated from the hockey players and vice versa," the official said. Parents, also are reported happy over the change. The changes will also be made at Poppleton and Pembroke parks.
A new record has been set for the number of skating days on the natural rinks. There have been 40 continuous skating days this year. The old record was 34 days.
