Kappa Alpha Theta Observes 89th Year

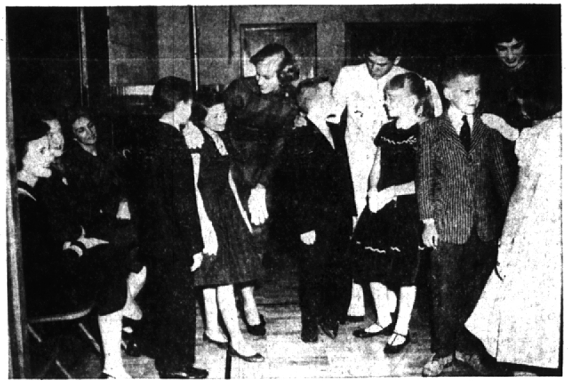
