BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—"Meet Your Candidate" night is on, despite indications that at least three of the 18 township office seekers invited will not attend. Mrs. Robert J. Eoff, Jr. said Tuesday.

The event to be held Feb. 5 at the Oak Hills high school cafeteria at 8 p.m. has been slated according to Mrs. Eoff, because the township Republican committee she chairs considers it "our duty."

Neighboring candidate Harvey Beggs, running for clerk, said this week that he would not attend the meeting. He gave as his reason a similar meeting two years ago, just before his bid for office of township supervisor was rejected by the voters. At the earlier meeting a letter was read recommending the reelection of Supervisor Arno F. Hulet, Beggs said.

The council voted unanimously to reject an appeal from an attorney speaking on behalf of Mt. Sinai hospital in Detroit for rezoning of 14 Mile property owned by the hospital to a commercial classification.

The new zoning would permit construction of a gasoline station on the property between Edgewood and Pierce, which is currently zoned for educational, research and office use.

Neighboring residents vigorously opposed the change at a public hearing held last fall by the planning commission. It later voted unanimously to recommend rejection of the request. The Sinai hospital had found for the property near a water tower was the Shell oil company, which wants to use it for a gas station.

THE COUNCIL also accepted the plan commission's recommendation for denial of request for multiple family apartment use of property on Gould court near Beverly school.

On the recommendation of Councilman Robert Reid, the council tabled the plan commission's recommendations on rezoning requests at the southeast corners of Southfield and 14 Mile roads, "until such time as the zoning master plan is completed."

# 'Authorities' Make Councilman See Red

WESTWOOD—Every time the word "authority" is mentioned, Westwood Councilman Ted Shurtleff sees red. And through it he pictures horns on the scalp of Dr. Douglas J. Wood, the councilman who is the liaison between the village and such multiple-community authorities as the Evergreen interceptor sewer and the Twelve-Town drain.

Monday night it was the question of Westwood's entry into the South Oakland hospital authority that redceded the scene for Shurtleff.

"We've already taken a beating from too many of these authorities," said Shurtleff, "and you're the champion of them, Dr. Wood!"

Shurtleff has long protested the \$50,000 charge to Westwood for participation in the Twelve-Town drain, and the village's 7.50 percent share in the \$5 million Evergreen interceptor project.

DR. WOOD cites the fact that the state health department declares pollution of areas in the authorization is a menace to the public health. The communities, including Westwood, are a n d r court order to end pollution.

The physician also urged Westwood's entry into the hospital authority, a move recommended by a unanimous vote of the Westwood village planning commission.

Membership in the hospital authority, Dr. Wood said, would protect village residents in case undesirable hospitals or clinics ask for building permits in the village. If the village refused to allow such clinics, hospital authority would strengthen the village's position in a court case. The authority would also act as advisor to the village on such hospital and clinic projects.
