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# Michigan Bell Pays \$12,498,000 to State School Fund

Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced its payment to the state primary school fund in 1958 was the largest in the company's history. Amounting to \$12,498,000, the payment again placed Michigan Bell as the top contributor to the fund.

Albert H. Warner, manager here, reported that \$11,747 of the total tax payment was allocated to three local public school systems.

Of this amount, the Birmingham school district received \$84,880.

Other allocations were Bloomfield Hills, \$19,887, and West Bloomfield township, \$13,630.

SCHOOLS throughout Oakland county received from Michigan Bell's payment a total of \$1,106,881. Payments were based on the county census of 175,948, and the following local census figures: Birmingham, 13,631; Bloomfield Hills, 3,122; and West Bloomfield Township, 2,187.

The tax payment amounted to \$6.29 for each of the 1,988,222 youngsters in the state between the ages of five and 19 who were on the census rolls for the 1957-58 school year.

Michigan Bell, in common with railroads, Pullman, railway express, telegraph, and other telephone companies, pays such a tax earmarked for the primary fund in lieu of certain local taxes.

## Lake Park Sewer Assessments OK'd

Special assessment roll has been approved for a new storm sewer on Lake Park, south from Redding. Birmingham city commission confirmed the estimated \$1735 project in one payment from assessed property owners.

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
