**Troy Expressway Route Questioned**

Troy tongues are wagging about the charges levied against the city commissioners by residents stating that the commissioners approved a route for the proposed Walter P. Chrysler expressway "on the quiet."

A special commission meeting last week was the only time residents had a chance to speak their mind on the topic. An agreement was made with the state highway department at that meeting.

Residents of Troy Meadows subdivision and Charwood subdivision have voiced a plan for reconsideration of the expressway routes.

**Troy Manager Resigns Post**

Troy City Manager C. R. Lukens resigned his post recently to accept a similar position in Chillicothe, Ohio.

The move came as a surprise to many, but insiders said that Lukens had been looking for another job since the new commission eliminated employees' seniority raises.

Lukens said, at the time of the cut, that he could offer little to people he hoped to hire. He mentioned that city hall personnel were in poor morale since the cut.

**DPW May Be Reorganized**

Troy officials' problem of finding a new DPW head may be eliminated if the city reorganizes the department and places it under City Engineer David W. Hasse.

Hasse would supervise road work, the water department and engineering. The plan was proposed by city commissioner Roy L. Duncan.

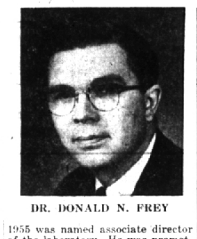
