

### Police Emphasize Dog Restrictions In Birmingham

Dog owners in Birmingham have been warned by Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley to keep their animals from running at large.

An increase in complaints brought the action. The dog ordinance provides for violation tickets for the first two offenses and a court appearance on the third violation within a year.

ALL DOG owners must obtain a license for their dog by March

1 or the licensing costs will be doubled. Fees at present are \$1 for male and unsexed dogs and \$2 for females.

Dogs must have been vaccinated for rabies since Dec. 15, 1958. The receipt of vaccination must be shown before a license will be issued to the owner. A metal tag will be given with each license and must be attached to the dog's collar.
