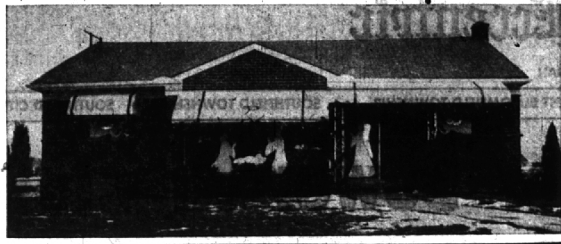


Homes 'Highlighted' for Holidays

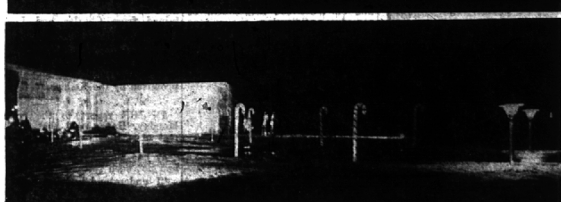

Westwood Won't Provide Backyard Rubbish Pick-Up

WESTWOOD — Initiating backyard pick-up of rubbish for the entire village of Westwood would be too costly, the council told a group of homeowners Monday night.

The request for backyard rubbish pick-up came from residents who objected to the sight of trash cans along curbs. But the extra service would cost the village nearly double what it is paying now, the contractors told the council.

VILLAGE President Marvin Cline urged the petitioners to appeal to their neighbors to remove empty trash cans from the curb immediately. He praised the reliability and promptness of the village truckers, who were low bidders at the time the contract was awarded.

The village provides twice-monthly rubbish pickup, a service paid for out of tax revenues. Residents wanting weekly service can contact with Painter and Rubenberger, who will provide backyard pick-up on the off weeks at a charge of \$1.50 monthly.

UNDER THE TERMS of Westwood's contract with the South Oakland county garbage and rubbish disposal authority, the village is obligated to contract with a single firm for the twice-monthly pick-up. The measure guarantees delivery of refuse to the authority.

The contract does not include garbage collection, for which residents must make individual arrangements with Painter and Rubenberger or some other contractor licensed by the village.
