Reverend Hoeflinger is the former minister of St. James Episcopal church in Birmingham.

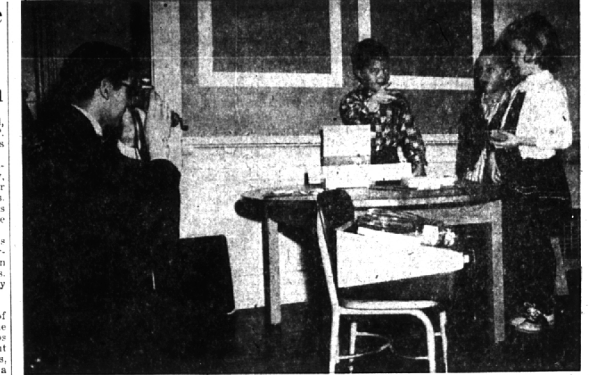

FRANKLIN—What is the school teaching our children in science? parents ask.

It took a lot of doing, but Franklin school Principal Daniel Welch has the answer... all neatly edited and ready to roll for the PTA meeting Monday at 8 p.m.

The busy school administrator was taking pictures and tape-recording actual classroom science projects throughout December.

"It's not that we have anything scientifically spectacular or sensational to show," Welch said. "But it seemed to be the best medium

through which parents could have an on-the-spot account of the typical science unit, developed through discussion, reading, writing and review."

IN THIRTY colored slides, and accompanying tapes, parents will not only see "Johnny" participating in group discussion, but they will also hear how he contributes to the class's general understanding of the subject.

The camera and tape recorder Welch used were purchased by the PTA in previous years with the hope that the school could develop a permanent audiovisual record of important events.

A full, serious and creative young administrator, Welch has used the tapes to give parents a better understanding of the child in school.
