## State Agency Takes Long Look At 5,000 Licenses

Nearly five thousand Michigan drivers whose traffic conviction record showed 12 points or more were cited in for re-examination June by Driver Improvement interviewers of the Department of State. According to James M. Hare, Secretary of State, 4782 June hearings were held in Michigan's 83 counties.

REAR REPORTED that 1,064 persons were suspended under the State's Financial Responsibility laws during the same month. Of these 249 were for unsatisfactory judgments, 179 were accident suspensions, and 636 were for drunk driving, negligent homicide, felony committed with a car, use of drugs while operating a motor vehicle, or other mandatory suspensions. The Department of State suspended the licenses of 347 drivers last week and revoked the driving privileges of 87 additional Michigan motorists.
