City Finds Snag In New Zoning Law

SOUTHFIELD — A failure to notify utilities of the new zoning law caused trouble in Southfield last week.

After erring in adopting a new zoning law in March a second error made during the redaction in June was discovered last week according to City Attorney James C. Allen.

Utilities—gas, electric and telephone—will be asked to sign waivers. All utilities are expected to sign.

Under state law utilities must be notified of major zoning changes, so that they may have an opportunity to check any changes.

The first error left legal force of the city's zoning in question for a three-week period.

"This puts three firemen back on the road," City Administrator Robert J. McNutt said. The communications department is his idea. The city has so far approved only the new phone system.

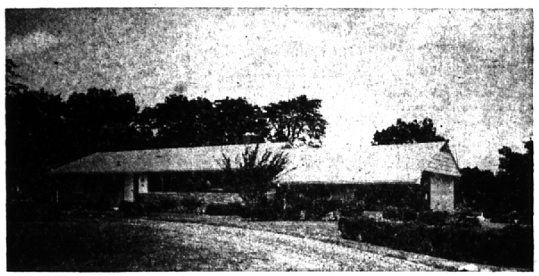
McNutt's request for four new communications officers has not been approved. He said the cost of hiring the men would be about \$7,000.

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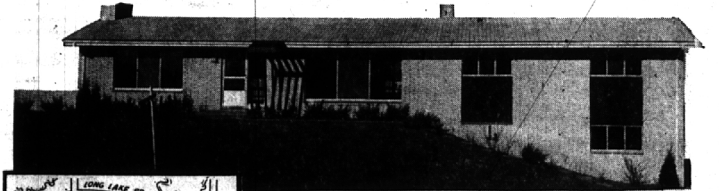
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
