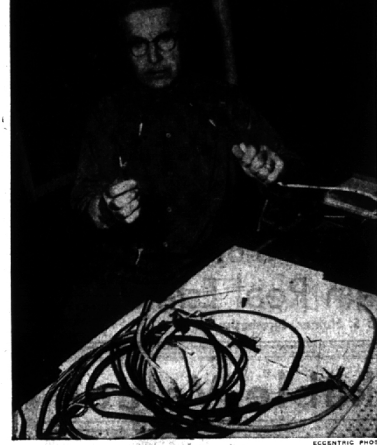

Electrician Warns Do-It-Yourselfers

BEVERLY HILLS—There's a close connection between faulty wiring and fires, which house at 17341 Buckingham, Beverly Hills, according to home owner Michael C. Urel.

The dangerous wiring which he discovered at his home prompted Urel to issue a warning to other Beverly Hills residents. "If we had plugged in a heater or put some other heavy load on the improperly installed circuit, we could have had a fire at our house," Urel stated.

A JOURNEYMAN electrician who is a Cinema projectionist, Urel recently discovered 15 violations of the village electrical code in his home. The violations had occurred, Urel states, when a previous owner installed additional wiring in his home.

Urel said no extensive "do-it-yourself" wiring projects should be carried out without first obtaining a home owner's permit from Village Clerk Alice Spencer. Village inspection always follows when a permit holder completes his electrical work. Village Electrical Inspector Alex W. Leskevich explained the type of "do-it-yourself" electrical projects requiring a home owner's permit.

UNDER THE village electrical code, Leskevich said, the permits must be obtained for installation of a plug outlet, a lighting fixture outlet, or any switch outlet. If the home owner does not do the work himself, Leskevich said, he must hire an electrical contractor licensed to operate in the village.

Leskevich also advised home owners to use 15-amp fuses. "The fuse is the weakest link in the chain," he said.

IN MOST CASES, the low-amp fuse will blow first and prevent a fire from breaking out, Leskevich said. But when Urel discovered the faulty wiring in his home, the wires were already scorched and scared, an indication that the overloaded circuits had reached the burning point.

Urel listed some of the electrical code violations a "do-it-yourself" had committed. AMONG THEM were poor connections, with concealed splices in walls; reversed connections; overloaded circuits; wire ends too short in boxes; junction boxes concealed in ceiling; wires left exposed to edge of concealed fixture, and wires entering through a ceiling line without shielding.

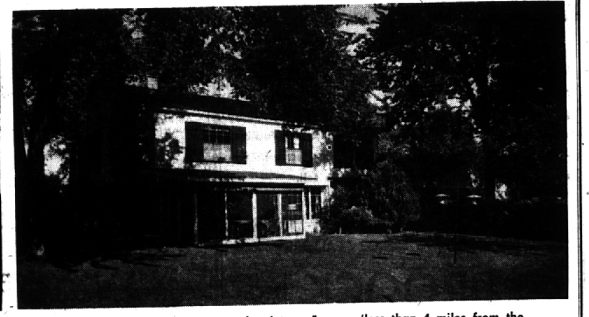

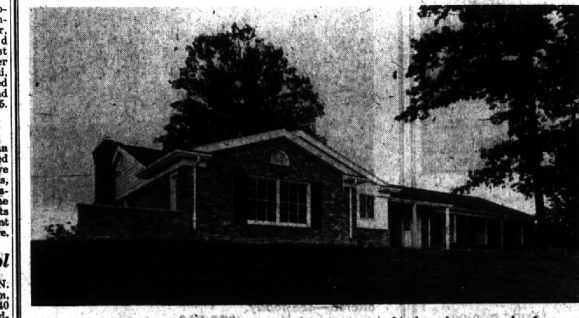
