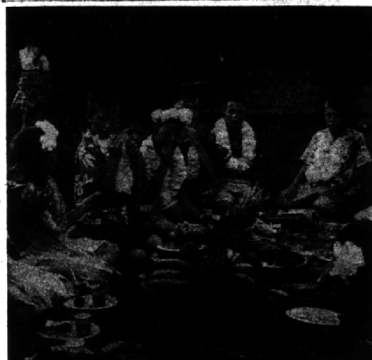

After their stay in Birmingham, the family spent some time with friends in Farmington before returning home.

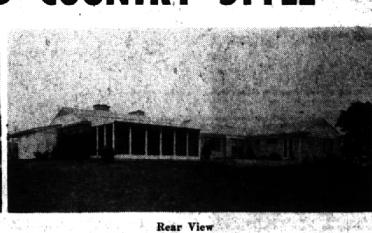
An afternoon outing can be a lot of fun as was experienced by some of the Trojton Manor women recently who met for lunch and shopping.
