She Came; She Liked; She Took

An almost well-dressed Detroit woman, who seemed to have a weakness for black dresses, is awaiting examination in Birmingham Municipal court on charges of shoplifting.

Mrs. Mary McBain, 43, of Detroit, is charged with taking more than \$27 worth of women's clothes from three Birmingham shops.

MRS. McBAIN was apprehended Friday afternoon in Kay Baum's as she tried to leave with stolen clothes, police said.

She had been to two other shops earlier that day. It was reported she started at Himehloch's, 168 W. Maple, where she bought some clothes. According to police, the stolen articles were then stuffed into the same bags.

SHE ALSO "shopped" at Jacobson's, 336 W. Maple. In the bags police found four dresses—three of them black—two swim suits, two blouses, a skirt, a pair of slippers, two sweaters. Dress sizes ranged from seven to 12.

MRS. McBAIN admitted having a few drinks at an East Jefferson bar in Detroit at 10 that morning. She started her Birmingham spree at about noon.

When police checked her car, they found five pairs of sunglasses, five umbrellas, and 13 empty shopping bags.

She has been released on \$350 bond to appear in municipal court July 24.

Troy News Briefs

Water System Springs Leak
There's a leak in Troy's water system. Nearly 24 per cent of the water Troy takes from six city wells is lost between the pumps and the billing meters, according to City Manager David W. Hasse.

In a confidential report to the

city commissioners, Hasse said the maximum loss should not exceed 16 per cent.

HASSE MADE a report to the commissioners Monday night when they met to discuss the water department audit. The meeting was closed to the public.

Troy has been plagued with water trouble during the past several years. There have been several instances where records have been missing from the files.

Shugart May Get Engineer's Post
The former city engineer of Hazel Park is in line for that position with the city of Troy.

Joseph L. Shugart, who resigned from Hazel Park when a running-

mate of Zigmund J. Niparko was elected last April, will probably be officially appointed to the position some time next week, according to Mayor Robert J. Huber.

Shugart would fill the vacancy left by Troy City Manager David W. Hasse who was promoted to his present position. Shugart would receive a salary of \$3,640.

'Gerrymander' Sets Sites as City Likes

TROY—City commissioners and planning consultants this week decided to realize pieces of land for four Evergreen Sewage district sections.

Commissioners thereby hoped to steal the steam from possible arguments and petitions from builders for smaller lots where the Evergreen interceptor is completed.

PRESENT planning provides for a maximum of 4,120 residential units; the sewage allotment for Troy is for 5,068 homes.

The problem would arise when builders would start demanding smaller sites—down to 75 and 90-foot lots, some commissioners feared.

Plan consultant George Viliian said there was little danger of their carving anything smaller than quarter-acre sites.

THE NEW zoning, however, cuts out enough half-acre sites to bring the total just under the allotted number.

A dissenting vote was cast by commissioner Louis Van der Grint who said that 300 unaccounted for sewer sites will be found and their use demanded by builders.

A public hearing is set for Aug. 3 in Troy high school.

City Closes Employee's Farm House
Troy electrical inspector Clifton Truesdell has discovered the city does not favor its employees. The farm house which he owns was ordered closed until it is repaired and sanitation requirements are met.

Policeman and PD Steadily Advancing
TROY—Things are moving and men are moving up in the Troy police department—one man has made sergeant and another was added to the force—swelling the total to 12.

Robert H. Mortenson, a patrolman since 1955, has been promoted to sergeant.

Lee Young, 31, of 2093 Virginia, Troy, is the 13th member of the force.
