Her fiancé attended Indiana university where he majored in business journalism. He recently finished a tour of duty in the Air Force. A December wedding is planned.



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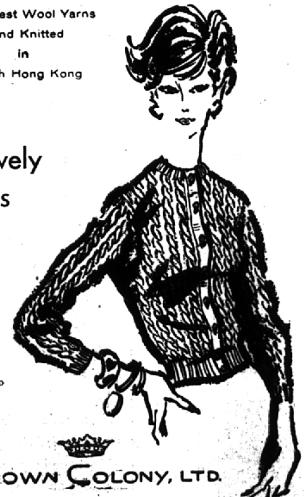
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
