Lathrup, Southfield Teenagers Invited To Outdoor Dance

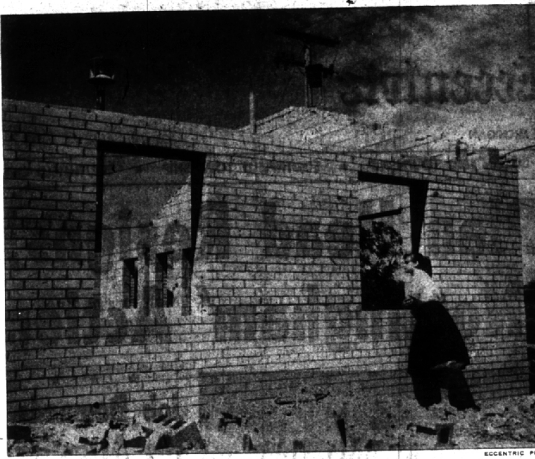

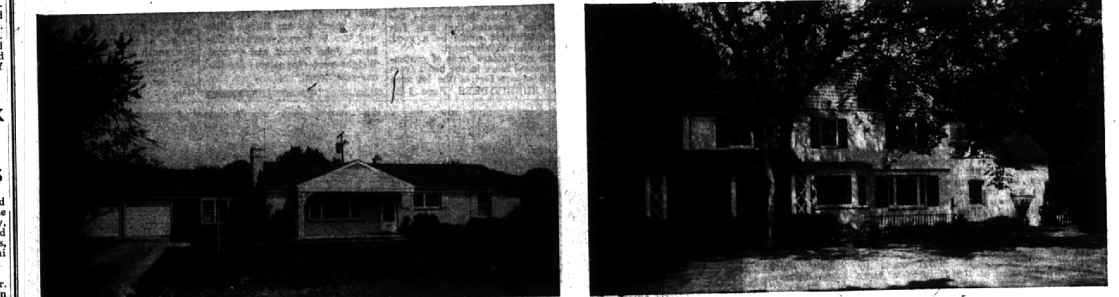
