The meeting which will be held at the home of Mrs. Weir at 8:30 p.m. will cover all matters pertinent to the league, including league schedules, trophies and general set-up.

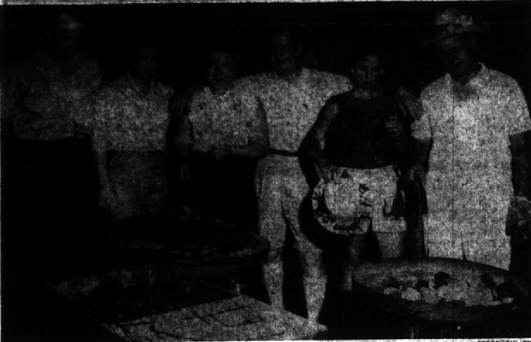
