### Road Work Is Progressing In Beverly Hills, Kouba Says

BEVERLY HILLS — Beverly Hills road work is progressing on an even keel these days, according to Road Commissioner Walter Kouba.

Negotiations were completed recently with contractors of the new Birmingham junior — senior high school for improving the condition of Evergreen road between 13 Mile and Beverly road.

The work was completed by the village with contractors sharing in the cost. The old surface was regraded, regravelled and the dust brought under control, according to Kouba.

WITH THE completion of the Evergreen interceptor, all gravel roads within the village have been graded, gravelled and dust controlled since June 1, he said. "We feel that this is excellent cooperation with the village contractors, who are retained to perform the work," Kouba commented. "However," he continued, "we are still faced with more inconveniences by the forthcoming installation of sewers, water and gas lines. We will try to keep the roads open during these projects and will restore them to good condition when the work is done."

us the comforts of home. After their two week stay, the two cowpokes ought to be able to ride and rope anything that moves.

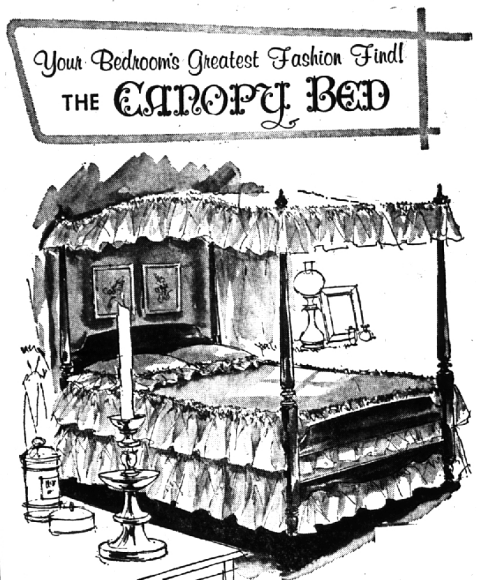

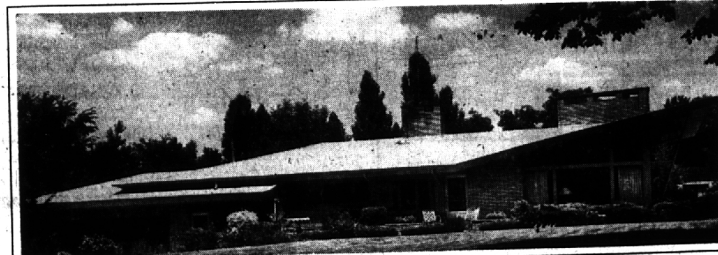

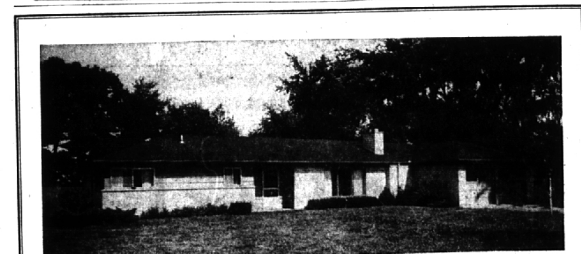
