

Set 'Sniper' Court Hearing For August 3

A hearing to determine the possible release of Oakland county's phantom sniper will be held August 3 before Oakland county circuit Judge Frank L. Doty.

Judge Doty sentenced Gary Taylor, 22, of Royal Oak, to the Ionia

state hospital for the criminally insane two years ago following the sniper's arrest.

Before he was caught, Taylor terrorized the area by shooting at women and he wounded two.

He was specifically charged with the wounding of Shirley Ann El and, then age 19, of Bloomfield Hills, in February of 1967. Miss El and now lives in California.

Ionia medical superintendent Dr. Perry C. Robertson requested the release of Taylor because he said the youth was cured.

Judge Doty, however, wanted to satisfy himself that Taylor was ready for outpatient treatment.

4th Was Safe At Least on Streets Here

Driver of the car, Mrs. Helen F. Martens, 1240 Lenox, Birmingham, said she had waited for traffic to clear, but had not seen the scooter. Blondo had swerved to avoid the collision but hit the car.

Mrs. Martens, the police said, was tickled for failure to yield the right-of-way.

ORDINANCE NO. 26

VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS, MICHIGAN

PLANNING BOARD ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATION OF A PLANNING BOARD FOR THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS, AND TO PRESCRIBE THE DUTIES, RESPONSIBILITIES AND POWERS THEREOF.

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. CREATION. There is hereby created a Planning Board for the Village of Beverly Hills to be known as the "Village Planning Board."

Section 2.01. MEMBERSHIP. The Village Planning Board shall consist of nine members, who shall be elected and reelected in the Village of different professions or occupations, and who shall be appointed by the Village Council. The term of each member so appointed shall be for a period of three years from the first day of July of the year in which he is appointed, or until his successor is appointed, except that in the case of the first Village Planning Board the term of each member shall be for a period of one (1) year each, three for a period of two (2) years each, and three for a period of three (3) years each, from the first day of August, 1969. Vacancies occurring otherwise than through the expiration of the term, shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term by the Village Council. All members of the Village Planning Board shall serve without compensation.

Section 3.01. REMOVAL FOR CAUSE. Members of the Village Planning Board may, after a public hearing, be removed for cause by the Village Council.

Section 4.01. ELECTIONS, MEETINGS AND RULES. The Village Planning Board shall, from its appointed members, elect a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary. The Village Clerk, or his or her deputy, shall assist the Village Planning Board and shall keep a record of all its proceedings. The Board shall hold at least one regular public meeting quarterly, shall adopt rules for the transaction of its business and shall keep a full and complete record of its resolutions, transactions, findings and determinations, which record shall be available to the Village Council upon request.

Section 5.01. CONSULTING SERVICES AND BUDGET. The Village Planning Board may call upon the Village Council for such services and data by the various departments as it may require. The Village Planning Board may recommend to the Village Council the securing of such professional and consulting services as it may require; provided, however, that no expenditures of funds shall be made, or contracts entered into for providing such professional or consulting services, unless the same shall first be approved and authorized by the Village Council. No later than the first day of April in each year, the Village Planning Board shall prepare and submit to the Village Council a tentative outline of its program for the ensuing Village fiscal year, together with its budget for such ensuing year, which outline and budget shall serve as a guide in the appropriation of monies by the Village Council. Provided, that nothing contained herein shall be interpreted to require the Village Council to appropriate the sum or amount required for such budget. No funds shall be expended in connection with the Village Planning Board in excess of amounts appropriated for that purpose by the Village Council.

Section 6.01. FUNCTION AND DUTIES. It shall be the function and duty of the Village Planning Board to advise the Village Council in regard to the proper development of the Village of Beverly Hills, and to make suggestions for the development of any areas outside its boundary which in the Board's judgment, bear relation to the planning of such municipality. In this regard, the Village Planning Board is authorized to advise with and cooperate with the planning and Legislative bodies of other governmental units in any area outside the boundaries of the Village of Beverly Hills. The Village Planning Board is authorized to prepare and submit recommendations for the physical development of the municipality, either in its entirety, or in part. Such recommendations, together with accompanying maps, charts and descriptive matter, shall indicate the Village Planning Board's suggestions for the development of such territory. Said Village Planning Board is also authorized to recommend for the guidance of the Village Council the same Ordinance for the control of the height, area, bulk, location and use of buildings and premises. The Village Planning Board may, from time to time, amend, extend or add to such recommendations, and the same shall be made with the general purpose of guiding and accomplishing a coordinated, adjusted and harmonious development of the municipality and its environs. The Village Planning Board may hold public meetings and/or hearings, from time to time, as it may deem advisable, necessary in connection with the proper performance of its functions hereunder. At least one joint meeting of the Village Council and Village Planning Board shall be held annually at a time to be designated by the Village President, and it shall be the duty of the Village President to call such meeting or meetings in accordance with the provisions hereof.

Section 7.01. RECOMMENDATIONS. When any recommendation, or part thereof, has been approved by the Village Planning Board, the same shall be referred to the Village Council.

Section 8.01. VILLAGE COUNCIL REFERRALS. In addition to the functions hereinbefore set forth, it shall be the function of the Village Planning Board to pass upon all matters referred to it by the Village Council, and to advise the Village Council the benefits of its judgment with relation to such matters so referred. Matters so referred may include, but not be restricted to, requests for change of zoning, requests for closing, opening or altering streets or alleyways, requests for issuing building permits, and any other matters which bear relation to the physical development or growth of the municipality.

Section 9.01. SEVERABILITY. The sections of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and the holding as invalid or unconstitutional of any section hereof shall not impair the remaining sections of this Ordinance.

Section 10.01. SHORT TITLE. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Village of Beverly Hills Planning Board Ordinance."

Section 11.01. REPEAL. All ordinances and resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall become effective upon the publication following the date of passage thereof.
