### Politics at its Prettiest

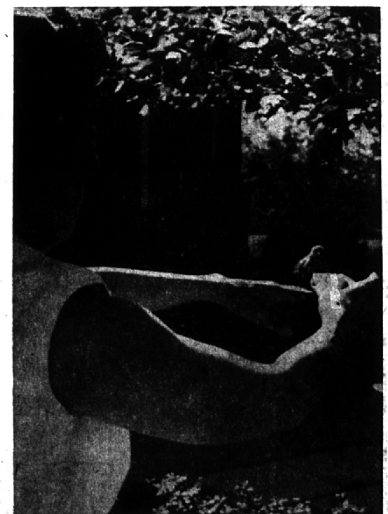
