


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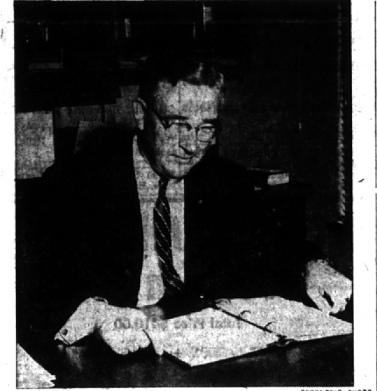

Rev. Harris Leaves For Wintry Brazil

The Rev. W. Glen Harris, of the First Presbyterian church of Birmingham, has found a new way to escape the summer heat. He left last week for a tour of Latin America and a meeting in Sao Paulo, Brazil. It's winter down there.

Before he went Rev. Harris commented that he did not expect any trouble of the kind Vice President Nixon encountered when he visited our southern neighbors.

"Not many people will know I'm there," he said. "Besides my visit isn't political. I'm going on a preaching mission."

He plans to preach in Mexico City, Guatemala City, Bogota, Colombia and Buenos Aires. The sermons will be delivered in Spanish, a language Rev. Harris has been studying since his 1952 trip to Mexico.

HE HAS FIVE different talks prepared in the Spanish language. Heaven and world peace are two of the topics of the sermons.

There was also tentative plans for a preaching engagement in Sao Paulo. This talk would be in English as Rev. Harris has not studied the Portuguese language spoken in Brazil. He commented that in everyday communication he can get along pretty well in Brazil with Spanish.

Part of his tour will be a 10-day stay in Sao Paulo for the World Presbyterian Alliance meeting. An anticipated 250 delegates from all over the globe will meet to discuss the work of the Presbyterians on a world basis.

THIS IS Rev. Harris' third trip to the world meeting. In 1954 he attended the convention at Princeton, N. J., and in 1948 journeyed to Geneva, Switzerland.

He will also attend a series of meetings in Rio de Janeiro to celebrate the centennial anniversary of the Brazilian Presbyterian church.

During his tour he will visit every country in Central and South America, including stops in missions in Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Panama, Ecuador, Bolivia, Lima, Peru, the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Jamaica and Havana, Cuba.

HE IS VISITING missions in the various Latin American countries as a delegate of the Commission of Ecumenical Missions, a new group replacing the Presbyterian Foreign Missions committee. The commission of 66 members from all parts of the United States is in charge of 1500 missionaries in 75 countries.

Rev. Harris is taking a plane to Latin America and will drive through the Philippines as a member of an international team. They plan to make a side trip visit to the archeological Indian ruins of the Yucatan peninsula.

At this time of the year the temperature in Brazil ranges from quite hot at the equator to the cooler southern end which is in the "midst of the winter season. The

country of Brazil, Rev. Harris will return Aug. 24. His family will remain in their home, 1017 Pilgrim, Birmingham.

The local congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses voted unanimously at a recent meeting to send petitions to the Argentine Republic to protest a decision denying recognition to the Jehovah's Witness group in Argentina.

Kenneth Pulficer, presiding minister of the local congregation said that in spite of liberal advancements made by the present Argentine government a few non-Catholic groups declared illegal by Peron have not yet been recognized.

Two different applications for recognition have been denied by the Ministry of Worship, a government department formed to control the registry of all non-Catholic religions in the country, he said. Also two futile appeals have been made to rescind an order denying Jehovah's Witnesses the right to register.

Pulficer said that in addition to petitions and letters from all Jehovah's Witness congregations in the U. S. groups in countries surrounding Argentina are circulating a petition addressed to the president Arturo Frondizi.

The Birmingham congregation with a membership of approximately 110 is writing letters to the Argentine government and the Argentine embassy in Washington, D.C.
