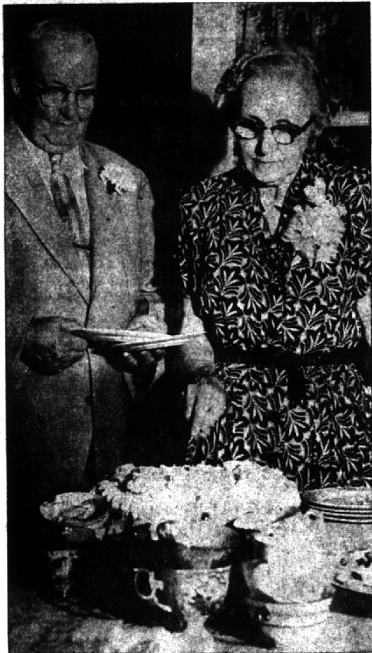

### 'Golden Anniversary'

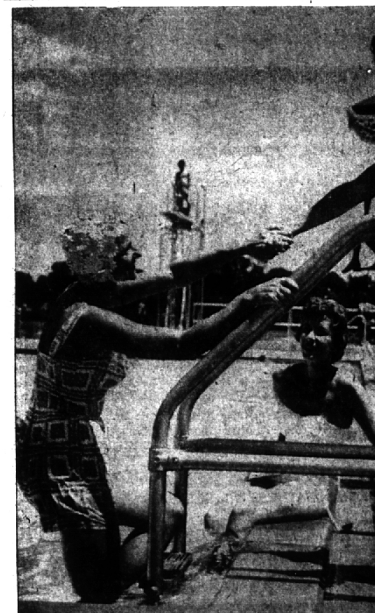

PLANS and specifications of a clubhouse, containing a lounge, limited dining facilities, a small kitchen and bar, lavatories, shower facilities and dressing rooms and two singles squash racquets courts will be completed in the near future. The clubhouse is expected to be available for occupancy in the early fall of 1960.
