Multiple Sclerosis Grant Awarded

Mrs. Senon Knudsen, 31500 Bingham Farms, board member of the Michigan chapter, national multiple sclerosis society announced that Wayne State University college of medicine has been awarded a \$9,315 research grant by the national multiple sclerosis society. According to Mrs. Knudsen, Dr. Morris Goodman, research associ-

ate, department of microbiology and neurology, Wayne State University college of medicine, started work July 1 on "protein specifications of serum and cerebrospinal fluid in the demyelinating diseases." The long term objective is to thoroughly examine and compare protein specifications of the serum and cerebrospinal fluid in certain neurological diseases in order to determine if characteristics exist in the demyelinating disease such as multiple sclerosis (MS) and others.

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Ferndaler to Lead August Emergency March of Dimes

Ernest Goldsworthy of Ferndale has been appointed county campaign director for the emergency appeal of the March of Dimes which will be held Aug. 1-25 it was announced today by the Rev. G. Burton Hodges, chairman of the Oakland county chapter of the national foundation.

Funds are urgently needed to care for local polio patients. The Emergency March of Dimes director immediately issued a call for volunteers to help with the special drive for \$70,000.

"THE POLIO emergency drive is necessary because the polio burden from past years is greater in this area," the March of Dimes volunteer said. "During last year's epidemic one out of every five cases in the nation occurred in Michigan."

"Many of the cases in this county require expensive long-term rehabilitation. Local and national funds for this purpose have been exhausted."

Beginning next year, the chapter plans to launch an intensive

program against arthritis and birth defects as well as polio, Goldsworthy said. The new program has already been started nationally with some research grants and rehabilitation pilot studies.
