ORDINANCE NO. 27
 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 1, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE LOCATION OF TRAFFIC AND INDUSTRIES AND THE LOCATIONS OF BUILDINGS DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES, TO REGULATE AND LIMIT THE HEIGHT AND BULK OF BUILDINGS HEREAFTER ERRECTED, TO REGULATE AND DETERMINE THE AREA OF YARDS, COURTS, AND OTHER OPEN SPACES, TO LIMIT AND RESTRICT THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF FAMILIES WHICH MAY BE HOUSED IN DWELLINGS HEREAFTER ERRECTED OR ALTERED, AND FOR SAID PURPOSES DIVIDE THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS INTO ZONES, TO PROVIDE A METHOD OF ADMINISTRATION, AND TO PRESCRIBE THE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. Ordinance No. 1, entitled "An Ordinance to regulate and restrict the location of traffic and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected, to regulate and determine the area of yards, courts, and other open spaces, to limit and restrict the maximum number of families which may be housed in dwellings hereafter erected or altered, and for said purposes divide the Village of Beverly Hills into zones, to provide a method of administration, and to prescribe the penalties for the violation of its provisions," be and is amended hereby by amending the Zone Map attached thereto and made a part thereof as follows:

(a) That Lots 61 through 66 inclusive of D. J. Healy's Golfhurst Subdivision are changed from a Residential 2 zone use to that of an Education-Research-Office-zone.

Section 2.01. Public hearing having been held herein on June 15, 1959, and the statutory notice having been published and mailed, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Another houseguest at the Christies is Miss Katherine Martin of Omaha, Neb., who is on her way home from a five week European trip.

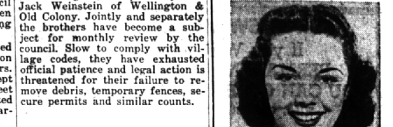
